3 THE CLERK: The court calls Tsimhoni versus  
4 Tsimhoni, 09-766749-DM.

5 THE COURT: Do you need another deputy? Do  
6 you want me to call for another one?

7 Will you call for another deputy?

8 THE COURT: Good mor -- good afternoon.

9 MR. SCHWARTZ: Good afternoon, your Honor.

10 My name is Jeffrey Schwartz, I've been called to the  
11 courtroom to represent Liam Tsimhoni. It's my  
12 understanding that the court is on the verge of holding him  
13 in contempt. I had a long discussion with him. I  
14 explained that he has basically two choices, that he could  
15 apologize to the Judge for not following orders and  
16 communicate with his father and submit to supervised  
17 visits, or the court's intention was that he's going to be  
18 held in contempt and he's going to be placed in Children's  
19 Village until he complies.

20 So I'll let him speak for himself and  
21 indicate to the court what his intention is.

22 THE COURT: All right, Sir, what is your name  
23 for the Record?

24 MR. TSIMHONI: Liam Tsimhoni.

25 THE COURT: What is -- what's -- what do you

1 want to say to the court, if anything?

2 MR. TSIMHONI: Okay, so I -- I do apologize  
3 if I -- I didn't understand that the rules of the -- like  
4 the -- with -- with -- like apologize to whatever I did to  
5 you, but I do not apologize for -- for not talking to him  
6 because I have a reason for that and that's because he's  
7 violent and he -- I saw him hit my mom and I'm not gonna  
8 talk to him.

9 THE COURT: All right. Well, the court finds  
10 you in direct contempt. I ordered you to have a healthy  
11 relationship with your father. I witnessed your mother at  
12 11:30 tell you very impassionedly that she wants you to  
13 talk to your dad, to talk to your dad, that he loves you,  
14 that he's not gonna hurt you, that he's not gonna hurt her.  
15 You are a defiant, contemptuous young man and I'm ordering  
16 you to spend the rest of the Summer -- and we'll review it  
17 -- we'll review it when school starts, and you may be going  
18 to school there. So you're going to be -- I'm ordering you  
19 to Children's Village. Is there anything you'd like to say  
20 about that?

21 MR. TSIMHONI: I didn't do anything wrong,  
22 so.

23 THE COURT: No, you did. You -- I ordered  
24 you to talk to your father. You chose not to talk to your  
25 father. You defied a direct court order. It's direct

1 contempt so I'm finding you guilty of civil contempt.

2 MR. TSIMHONI: But he was the one that --  
3 something wrong.

4 THE COURT: Pardon?

5 MR. TSIMHONI: How come -- I thought there  
6 was like rules when -- rules for like not, you know, not  
7 hitting someone, why am I going to the --

8 THE COURT: I ordered you -- I will say this  
9 again, and apparently you're -- you're supposed to have a  
10 high IQ, which I'm doubting right now because of the way  
11 you act, you're very defiant, you have no manners, I  
12 ordered you to have a relationship with your dadder -- with  
13 your dad. I ordered you to talk to your father. Your mom  
14 told you to talk to your father. There is no reason why  
15 you do not have a relationship with your father.

16 Your father has never been charged with  
17 anything, your father's never been convicted of anything.  
18 Your father doesn't have a personal protection order  
19 against him. Your father is well liked and loved by the  
20 community, his co-workers, his family, his colleagues.  
21 You, young man, have got it wrong. I think your father is  
22 a great man who has gone through hoops for you to have a  
23 relationship with you. You are in contempt and you are  
24 going to live in Children's Village. Remind me how old you  
25 are?

1 MR. TSIMHONI: Fifteen.

2 THE COURT: You may stay in there until you  
3 graduate from high school.

4 MR. BOSSORY: And Judge, just for the Record,  
5 I'd like to make clear that my client, mother, did comply  
6 with the court's directives. The court asked mother to  
7 speak with the children about the -- the necessity of the  
8 relationship with their father and I believe she did so to  
9 the court's satisfaction. So as far as that -- that aspect  
10 of it, I would just like to put that on.

11 THE COURT: And that was very well said.

12 Mother, I appreciate that you did say that.  
13 It may have been way too late. It probably was way too  
14 late. Your children -- you need to do a research program  
15 on Charlie Manson and the cult that he has. Your behavior  
16 in the hall with me months ago, your behavior in this  
17 courtroom, your behavior back there, is unlike any I've  
18 ever seen in any 46,000 cases. You, young man, are the  
19 worst one. So you have bought yourself living in  
20 Children's Village, going to the bathroom in public, and  
21 maybe Summer school, I don't know, but you and mom, the  
22 only person allowed on his -- in his -- well, I'll it in  
23 here, you're not allowed to visit him, it's only your  
24 father and any therapist your -- and anyone your dad  
25 chooses to bring in. And your attorney.

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MR. BOSSORY: Just --

THE COURT: Mr. Schwartz, I appreciate you accepting the court's appointment, you're an excellent lawyer. I know you did your best, just like you would try to do in every case. You had very simple choices and you're clearly -- clearly very messed up.

MR. BOSSORY: Judge, just for the Record --

THE COURT: Very messed up.

MR. BOSSORY: -- I'd like to place an objection that mom would like to visit the child to the extent approved by Children's Village. She did comply with the court today and I know that it's very important for her to maintain as much contact with her son as permissible by both the court and -- and then the Village.

THE COURT: All right, I -- I accept your objection for the Record.

MR. SCHWARTZ: Your Honor, just for the Record, I do have a sentence set for 1:15 in --

THE COURT: You are released. We're done -- we're --

MR. SCHWARTZ: I was just going to indicate to the court I'm going to be in Judge Potts at 1:15, I'm going to be in Referee Racey at 1:30, I'll be in the building until about 2:30 if anything changes.

THE COURT: Okay. So, I'm sentencing you to



1 Children's Village, I guess Mandy's Place, pending you  
2 following the court's direct order. When you can follow  
3 the court's direct order and have a normal, healthy  
4 relationship with your father I would review this. I mean,  
5 it might be one day, it might be -- it might be three  
6 years. It might be til you're 18.

7 This is over your dad's objection. I want  
8 this to be heard. Obviously, it's over your mother's  
9 objection. Your dad -- I wanted to do this because of your  
10 horrific behavior a long time ago and your dad begged me  
11 not to. He begged me not to. So it was only because of  
12 your dad -- I would have switched custody and they would  
13 have appealed because I find it's against -- it's hurting  
14 -- you are so mentally messed up right now and it's not  
15 because of your father. And one day you are going to  
16 realize what's going on in this case and you're gonna  
17 apologize to your dad.

18 So, that's my order. We'll set a review  
19 hearing I guess what, September 1<sup>st</sup>? Unless you, for  
20 whatever reason, talk to your dad and your dad comes to me  
21 and says, "Oh, my gosh" -- oh, and he needs to have  
22 counseling in Children's Village. And your dad says,  
23 "Judge Gorcyca, I -- my son has seen the light and he's  
24 changed and can -- can you let him out? And he's -- wants  
25 to have a relationship with me." And then I'll do it, so.

1 MR. BOSSORY: Judge, before you --

2 THE COURT: So dad, just let us know when  
3 that happens.

4 MR. BOSSORY: Judge --

5 THE COURT: And if it doesn't happen --  
6 actually, you know what, we're just going to set a review  
7 hearing when you're 18. Dad, if you ever think that he has  
8 changed and therapy has helped him and he's no longer like  
9 Charlie Manson's cult, then you let us know and we can do  
10 it.

11 MR. BOSSORY: Judge, may -- may my client  
12 speak or say -- say some words to Liam before he's taken --  
13 (multiple speakers) --

14 THE COURT: I mean, there's nothing but what  
15 she's saying, no.

16 MR. BOSSORY: Just possibly a good bye, talk  
17 to your dad, that type of thing.

18 THE COURT: She's already done that. He's a  
19 defiant child. He's your child and you're defiant.

20 MS. TSIMHONI: Can I try one more time?

21 MR. BOSSORY: May she try one more time in  
22 the court -- in the court? I think Liam is maybe a little  
23 bit more appreciative of all the pressure that --

24 THE COURT: No.

25 MR. BOSSORY: -- is being put on him right

1 now.

2 THE COURT: No.

3 MR. BOSSORY: It may be worthwhile to do it.

4 THE COURT: I have said this to you over and  
5 over and over again, this deputy right here, Deputy  
6 Maloney, has been amazing in trying to help you. He tried  
7 you -- again today He tried last couple months ago. My  
8 court -- my family counselor, nothing is getting through to  
9 you so you're going to -- you're liv --

10 MS. TSIMHONI: Can I try one more time?

11 THE DEPUTY: All set, your Honor?

12 THE COURT: We're all set.

13 MR. SCHWARTZ: Thank you, your Honor.

14 THE COURT: (Undecipherable) -- paperwork.

15 MR. DEAN: May I approach, your Honor?

16 THE COURT: Yes, Mr. Dean.

17 All right, can we -- Andrew, could you

18 approach?

19 MR. BOSSORY: Yes, Judge.

20 THE COURT: Dad, approach?

21 (At 12:15:28 p.m., hearing recessed)

22 (At 12:15:45 p.m., hearing resumed)

23 THE COURT: Andrew will tell you. Rowie  
24 would like to talk to his dad so we're going to see how  
25 that goes before we have that one. Ms. Chase --

1 (undecipherable) -- would you go back on your lunch hour?

2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Inaudible).

3 THE COURT: Thank you.

4 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Judge, is there --

5 THE COURT: We're waiting for someone for --  
6 for --

7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: She's already in the  
8 back, I'm sorry.

9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Oh, okay --  
10 (inaudible).

11 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Natalie, your  
12 attorney's here.

13 THE COURT: Review September. We'll say the  
14 day after Labor Day. Liam is in direct civil contempt,  
15 sentenced to Children's Village, Mandy's Place, review  
16 September 8<sup>th</sup>, 9:00 a.m. That work? Is that good, Deputy?

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.

18 THE COURT: There's two other little kids  
19 that are -- that are very well going too.

20 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Oh, are they?

21 THE COURT: Yeah.

22 (At 12:17:40 p.m., hearing concluded)

23 (At 12:33:58 p.m., hearing recalled)

24 THE CLERK: The court recalls Tsimhoni versus  
25 Tsimhoni, case number 09-766749-DM.

1 MS. COOK: Morning, your Honor. Karen Cook.  
2 I was just appointed as attorney for Natalie.

3 THE COURT: Is mom here? Dad's here, is  
4 mom's attorney here?

5 All right, good afternoon. Thank you for  
6 accepting the court appointment.

7 MS. COOK: Oh, thank you. Your Honor, I've  
8 had an opportunity to talk to Natalie and told her the  
9 consequences of not being respectful to the court and to  
10 court orders, and told her what Children's Village was  
11 like, which I have a very good acquaintance with, and told  
12 her my best legal advice would be for her to apologize for  
13 whatever she did. I don't have a complete narrative on  
14 everything she's done, and she's absolutely refusing to  
15 cooperate even with me.

16 THE COURT: Oh, it's so interesting. So  
17 interesting. Is dad -- is mom here and mom's attorney?

18 MR. LANSAT: They're coming right now, your  
19 Honor.

20 THE COURT: Okay.

21 MR. LANSAT: Can you just put in the order,  
22 your Honor, that I at least be able to see them at the --  
23 (multiple speakers) --

24 THE COURT: Oh, yes.

25 MR. LANSAT: -- please? Thank you.

1 THE COURT: On the other one can you add --  
2 yeah.

3 MR. LANSAT: I did tell Mr. Dean to come in  
4 with Rowie.

5 THE COURT: All right. We're -- oh.

6 MR. DEAN: I appreciate that -- on behalf --  
7 Rowie right here. Stand right next to me.

8 THE COURT: All right, will you state your  
9 name?

10 MR. DEAN: Thank you, your Honor. Good af --  
11 or good afternoon. Michael Dean, P32631, appointed to  
12 represent Rowie, how do you pronounce your last name again?

13 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Tiphoni (ph).

14 MR. DEAN: Tiphoni in the -- in the matter  
15 here before your Honor. I appreciate on behalf of my  
16 client all the time that you've given me to talk with my  
17 client about the action that you're looking for and the  
18 possible consequences. I've -- I've -- basically, I've  
19 apprised him of what he needs to do today before your Honor  
20 and basically, he's going to tell you right now -- I have  
21 no idea.

22 THE COURT: Okay. Sir, since you're older --  
23 what, you're older, right?

24 MR. DEAN: Yes.

25 MR. BOSSORY: He's the middle, yes.

1 THE COURT: What's your name, Sir?  
2 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Rowie.  
3 THE COURT: How old are you?  
4 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Ten.  
5 THE COURT: What's your name, Ma'am?  
6 MS. COOK: Natalie?  
7 MISS NATALIE TSIMHONI: Natalie.  
8 THE COURT: How old are you?  
9 MISS NATALIE TSIMHONI: Nine.  
10 THE COURT: All right. All right, what do  
11 you want to say, Rowie?  
12 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Judge, I'm sorry for my  
13 behavior, and dad, I'm sorry for my behavior --  
14 MR. DEAN: Look in his eyes I told you,  
15 remember to look --  
16 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Dad, the Judge wanted me  
17 to talk to you so here is something about myself. I enjoy  
18 soccer and I hope to be on the soccer team --  
19 (undecipherable).  
20 MR. DEAN: And what do you hope -- do you  
21 mind, your Honor? What do you -- what is the thing that  
22 you're --  
23 THE COURT: Oh, it's impressive.  
24 MR. DEAN: -- we talked about, what do you --  
25 you're going to tell the Judge that you're going to be

1 doing from this point forward when you get together with  
2 your dad, what was the "C" word we talked about?

3 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Communicate.

4 MR. DEAN: Communicate. That means dialogue,  
5 back and forth. Remember I told you not to be just a stick  
6 in the mud, your dad asks you a question, you respond.  
7 That's how one develops a relationship, starting through  
8 communication. Are you in agreement with starting to  
9 communicate with your father so that you can build a  
10 relationship?

11 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Yes.

12 MR. DEAN: Look at your father's eyes and say  
13 that.

14 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Yes.

15 MR. DEAN: Look at the Judge's eyes and say  
16 that.

17 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Yes.

18 THE COURT: Let me hold off with you. What  
19 do you want to say, Natalie?

20 MS. COOK: I'm just asking her now that her  
21 brother's apologized if she would reconsider?

22 Would you like to apologize now that your  
23 brother has?

24 MISS NATALIE TSIMHONI: (No audible  
25 response).



1 THE COURT: I'm taking that as a no. All  
2 right, Natalie doesn't want to say anything --

3 MS. COOK: I apologize, I was trying to get  
4 her to reconsider.

5 THE COURT: No, you're so sweet, but  
6 obviously -- no, no, Natalie, don't read what your brother  
7 wrote. You're your own person. Do you know what? I know  
8 you're kind of religious. God gave you a brain. He  
9 expects you to use it. You have a brain, you are not your  
10 brother. You are not your big, defiant brother who's  
11 living in jail. Do you want to live in jail? Just tell me  
12 this right now.

13 MS. COOK: Do you want to go to jail?

14 THE COURT: Mom, you must step away.

15 THE DEPUTY ONE: Go ahead and step over here,  
16 Ma'am.

17 THE DEPUTY TWO: Step away.

18 THE DEPUTY ONE: Step towards the back.

19 Thank you.

20 THE DEPUTY TWO: Step up. There you go.

21 MS. COOK: Okay, I'm urging you to apologize  
22 and say you will go and try to work with your father at  
23 visits. Can you do that?

24 MISS TSIMHONI: I'm sorry, I'll try to work  
25 with my father at visits.

1 THE COURT: Well, you're going to stay here  
2 all day and it's going to be up to your dad. I'm going to  
3 see how you two act. Maybe the three of you should go to  
4 lunch in the cafeteria? If you have any hesitation at all  
5 you're living in Children's Village. You're living in  
6 Children's Village.

7 You know what that would do to your mother,  
8 going home, riding down the elevator without you? Can you  
9 guys think about someone besides yourself? You should be  
10 thinking about your father and what your father has gone  
11 through unnecessarily because of I don't why? And it  
12 despises -- it's despicable to me what your father has gone  
13 through when he loves you and he loves you, and he wants to  
14 be in your life. He wants you to be in his life. I'm so  
15 upset with you, I'm so upset with you, I'm even more upset  
16 with your brother, and I won't say what I think about your  
17 mother. I think your mom did something nice in the jury  
18 room for once. And I like your dad. And I -- you have me  
19 as your Judge for five and a half years.

20 How old will you be, Natalie? Let's see,  
21 you're going to be a teenager. You want to have your --  
22 you want to have your birthdays in Children's Village? Do  
23 you like going to the bathroom in front of people?

24 MS. COOK: She said no, thank you.

25 THE COURT: Is your bed soft and comfortable

1 at home?

2 MISS NATALIE TSIMHONI: Yes.

3 MS. COOK: You need to talk. Speak up.

4 THE COURT: I'll tell you this, you two don't  
5 have a nice lunch with your dad and make this up to your  
6 dad you're going to come back here at 1:30 and I'm going to  
7 have the deputies take you to Children's Village.

8 So, Ms. Chase -- (undecipherable) -- Mr.  
9 Lansat, is he even here? Who do you suggest have -- Mr.  
10 Art, can --

11 MR. LANSAT: Mr. Gallagher, can we -- we can  
12 come -- I think he can go with those two --

13 THE COURT: Dad, what do you think? What is  
14 your suggestion, dad? And I want you to know, I wanted to  
15 do this to you all many times, your dad said, "Don't, Judge  
16 Gorcyca, please don't do this, Judge Gorcyca." It was  
17 because of your dad that I didn't do it. Your mom didn't  
18 want me to either, but the ball is in your dad's court.  
19 Your dad is in charge. Unless you want to live in  
20 Children's Village. It's up to you. I have put other  
21 children in Children's Village. You guys can all hang out  
22 together.

23 Dad, what do you suggest for lunch?

24 MR. TSIMHONI: Maybe downstairs?

25 THE COURT: Everything is recorded and I'm

1 going to watch. You walk -- the minute you pull into this  
2 courtroom -- courthouse, you're video'd. Outside, they can  
3 get you walking in, they can get you everywhere except in  
4 the bathroom.

5 MR. DEAN: What do you have to say?

6 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: I'll go with my brother  
7 then.

8 THE COURT: Pardon?

9 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: I'll go with my brother.

10 THE COURT: What does that mean?

11 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Children's Village.

12 THE COURT: So you don't want to have

13 parenting time with your father?

14 MR. BOSSORY: Do they realize that they would  
15 not be seeing their siblings?

16 THE COURT: You're not even going to be with  
17 your brother. That's cool. You won't be in the same cell.  
18 I'll put in there "Stay away from your brother."

19 All right, so you're admitting you won't have  
20 parenting time with your dad?

21 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: (No audible response).

22 THE COURT: Okay. Is that a yes?

23 MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI: Mm-hmm.

24 MR. DEAN: You have to say your words.

25 MS. COOK: You want to go to lunch with your

1           dad?

2                               MISS NATALIE TSIMHONI:  No.

3                               THE COURT:  Okay.  The court finds --

4                               MS. COOK:  Now she's refusing because her  
5           brother is.

6                               MISS NATALIE TSIMHONI:  I'm not refusing  
7           because my brother is.

8                               MS. COOK:  Why are you refusing?

9                               MISS NATALIE TSIMHONI:  I'm refusing because  
10          I want to refuse.

11                              THE COURT:  That's ridiculous, I have to say.

12                              MS. COOK:  I told her --

13                              THE COURT:  I've never seen anything like  
14          this.  One day you can watch this video and realize that  
15          you two have been brainwashed.  Your dad is a good man.  
16          Your dad is a good man who loves you.  You have been  
17          brainwashed.  You are brainwashed.  This is not normal  
18          behavior.  Only -- no adult in this courtroom, except one,  
19          thinks this is normal.  Every single adult in this  
20          courtroom thinks you have been brainwashed.  Your dad is a  
21          good man.  And wipe that smirk off your face, Rowie.

22                              MR. ROWIE TSIMHONI:  It's not a smirk.

23                              THE COURT:  I don't know what that is.  I've  
24          never seen anything like it.  You're a defiant,  
25          contemptuous young man and the court finds both of you in

1 direct contempt. You both are going to live in Children's  
2 Village. Your mother is not allowed to visit, no one on  
3 your mom's side is allowed to visit. Only your father and  
4 therapist and Mr. Lansat. When you are ready to have lunch  
5 with your dad, to have dinner with your dad, to be normal  
6 human beings, I will review this when your dad tells me you  
7 are ready. Otherwise, you are living in Children's Village  
8 til you graduate from high school. That's the order of the  
9 court. Good bye.

10 MS. COOK: Will I be released or do you want  
11 me to --

12 THE COURT: Yes, thank you.

13 MS. COOK: Okay, thank you, your Honor.

14 MR. DEAN: Thank you, your Honor.

15 THE COURT: The court appreciate --

16 MS. COOK: I apologize for not getting any  
17 farther.

18 THE COURT: I need to write on the other one  
19 no one from mom's side is allowed to visit.

20 MR. BOSSORY: Judge, will the court be  
21 appointing attorneys for the children longer term for their  
22 review hearing dates?

23 THE COURT: Yes. Yes, I'll keep the attorney  
24 -- I'll -- actually, I'm going to keep the attorneys for  
25 the review date, which will be September 8<sup>th</sup> at 9:00,

1 unless, dad, you come earlier. Because you -- you're going  
2 to -- you're going to be on the approved list with Mr.  
3 Lansat. When the children say they're ready to have a  
4 relationship with you I will -- when you're ready to come  
5 in I'll do it that day. We can do it ex parte. Not ex  
6 parte, but --

7 MS. COOK: So attorneys are staying on?

8 THE COURT: Yes, is that okay?

9 MS. COOK: Okay. And can we get a copy of  
10 the order -- can I get a copy of the order then?

11 MR. BOSSORY: I'll get in touch.

12 MR. TSIMHONI: Do you have a card?

13 MR. BOSSORY: I don't have one because I'm  
14 attorney for mom. I'm Andy. We haven't even had a chance  
15 to meet.

16 MS. COOK: Andy?

17 MR. BOSSORY: Bossory.

18 MS. COOK: Okay.
